Year 10 Make Plants in Biology



In Biology, we studied about how many plants are able to reproduce asexually. Asexual reproduction results in the production of genetically identical offspring called clones. Some plants use runners, which are special stems that grow out from the other plant. Others produce new plants from bits of leaves or roots. This helps them spread quickly in areas near the parent plant. Humans can clone plants by taking cuttings.


Our teacher, Mrs Stockwell, showed us how to take a cutting. We cut off a section of the stem from a plant and we placed

the cut shoot of the plant in a test tube full of water. It took the plants two months to grow enough roots to be planted in soil. Our teacher showed us how to pot up our plants and then we took our cuttings home. Some of my friends even named their plants!


This was an amazing lesson and we are happy to have this opportunity. Thank you Mrs Stockwell for allowing us to grow our own plants.

Tutankhamun Exhibition



Last Sunday, I visited the Saatchi Gallery in London to see *Tutankhamun: Treasures of the Golden Pharaoh*. The legend of the young pharaoh captured imaginations globally when his tomb was unearthed by British explorer Howard Carter and financier Lord Carnaryon in 1922.



The exhibition was packed with over 150 original objects from the tomb, 60 of which have travelled from Egypt for the first and final time, before they return for permanent display within the Grand Egyptian Museum.

I particularly enjoyed learning the story

of how he was discovered and the way archaeologists' theories on his life have developed as scientific techniques improve; for example, he was initially believed to be murdered, as x-rays prompted researchers to speculate that Tutankhamun died from a blow to the head; however, a full-body CT scan of the mummy showed that the head wound occurred after his death.

Malaria has shown up in subsequent DNA tests - it is now believed that, weakened by the disease, he died as a result of an infected leg wound he incurred in an accident.

A quote from Ernest Hemingway, shown during a short film at the start of the exhibition, has remained in my mind:

"Every man has two deaths; when he is buried in the ground, and the last time someone says his name".

In this way, Tutankhamun has achieved immortality. The exhibition is open in London until 3rd May; it is well worth a visit!

"Tartan is made of wool. People wear it as scarves or skirts."


"A Tartan skirt is called a 'kilt."
