Year 10 Success at Biology Challenge

Biology Challenge is a national competition run each year by The Royal Society of Biology.

The competition consisted of two online papers whose questions were set to reflect not just a secure knowledge of the school curriculum but also to reward those students whose knowledge of Biology has been increased. This was achieved

by reading books and magazines, watching natural history programmes and taking notice of the news media for items of biological interest.

There were over 23 thousand entries this year and I am delighted that this year our students gained a total of 32 awards, including 16 medal winners. Sophia gained a Gold medal, putting her in the top 5% of the competition.

Seven students achieved Silver medals, Shahd, Rohaan, Mia, Dora, Abhirra, Lilia and Suraiya. Eight students gained Bronze medals, Evancika, Ilma, Jessica, Indrani, Aparnaa, Anna O, Anna K-S and Chenai. A further six students were Highly Commended and another 10 students were Commended.

Well done to all the award winners and to everyone else who took part.

Charlotte Named Joint Winner of YPTE Essay Competition

"Many congratulations to Charlotte in Year 12, who has just been announced as the joint winner of the inaugural 2,000 word essay writing competition run by the Young People's Trust For The Environment and sponsored by Eurostar".

The competition challenged 15 to 18 year-olds to write 2,000 words to Change the World. Entrants could choose four topics: climate change, sustainable development, responsible travel and reducing waste.

The YPTE website says:

The quality of (the winners') work was outstanding and they both produced some very effective arguments and some fantastic ideas for possible solutions to two of the key environmental issues we face today. Charlotte chose to write about how we can tackle climate change, whilst Kirsty addressed how it may be possible to live more sustainably.

Charlotte writes:

A few weeks ago I got the opportunity to have a zoom meeting with a worker from Eurostar, the director of the YPTE (Young People's Trust for the Environment) charity, one of their presidents (Cel Spellman), and two of their young trustees who created the essay competition. During the meeting we talked about current attitudes towards climate change and some of the short-term environmental successes that have come from countries going into lockdown – like the clearer Venice canals.

I also got the chance to speak to the other competition winner, Kirsty, who spoke about the importance of global co-operation so that developing countries can industrialise with less impact. We were both awarded our virtual certificates on call, which I enjoyed. Luckily Eurostar have also agreed to extend the tickets we both won, as travelling this year might be problematic.

YPTE has also allowed me to become one of their 'young trustees' which is exciting as it means I can attend meetings and stay involved with the charity.

Overall, it was really inspiring seeing so many people passionate about the environment and hearing their perspectives and plans for the future.

Churchill College, Cambridge Q&A Session at Whitgift

Earlier this term fifteen Sixth Form students attended a lunchtime Q&A session at Whitgift School, organised by Matt Bullimore, the Widening Participation Officer at Churchill College, Cambridge, the link college for Croydon schools.

This talk focused on applying to Oxbridge, the admissions process and life at Oxford and Cambridge and was for students who were considering an application to Oxford or Cambridge next year. Questions answered by Matt ranged from: How to choose a college; what should be in my Personal Statement to make it stand out?; admissions tests and the college system.

Most surprising was that there was no specific reasoning as to why you should choose a particular college, other than personal preference. As most already knew, it is the passion you show for a subject and the extra reading/knowledge you have gained through supra-curricular activities, which can make a candidate stand out.

Our potential Oxbridge candidates found the session informative and are now keen to take the advice on board in their future applications.

Year 9 Student Learns Korean



I had to change my skills section for my Duke of Edinburgh award to something I could do from home, following the Covid-19 lockdown.

I chose to learn Korean, and was pleasantly surprised by the logical writing system and Korean alphabet, called "hangul" or 한글.

It is made up of 10 basic vowel sounds and 14 consonants. Each syllable in a word is in a separate square. For example, in the word hangul, the two symbols are 한 and 글.

I have been using free YouTube tutorials to learn it, and now that I know the basic alphabet I can begin reading simple words and can read some vocabulary, without having to write out the pronunciation in English.

I will probably continue even after I have finished the skills section. Hopefully soon I will be able to slowly read simple children's stories and work my way up onto more complicated books in Korean.






Olivia in 2J writes:

Archives Update

Old Palace holds a small but important repository of archives relating to our school's rich history. Since January, Esther Mann, (Heritage Manager for the Whitgift Foundation), and a small group of eager volunteers have undertaken some superb work in helping to record and protect archive materials including photographs, items of uniform and staff log books. Esther has kindly written a brief update on this work:

Over the last few months, the Foundation volunteers and I have been organising the Old Palace archives. We have slowly been documenting and organising newspaper cuttings and the vast collection of photographs according to date and event details. When a date is absent or unclear, we undertake internet research to ascertain more specific information. Hopefully this will enable us to establish an accurate record of special occasions, awards and practices within the school.

Archive items are slowly being added to a basic database with the intention to extend the object information at a later

point; this will provide the opportunity for some level of research and retrieval. Over time, scanned images will also be uploaded. All items are being placed in acid free boxes and wrapped to ensure their long term preservation.

I am immensely grateful to Esther and her team for their work and look

forward to embarking on archive-based projects with students and the wider community.
