


Pupils in Year 6 enjoy a lunchtime knitting club with Mrs Adamson every Monday.

Year 8 Drama Explores Matilda



Students in Year 8 had an exciting start to the term in Drama.

They studied the play 'Matilda', based on Roald Dahl's beloved children's book. In lessons, students developed a wide-range of acting skills and learned how to perform in the style of musical theatre acting. Students really enjoyed exploring the characters of the play in different scenes.

Year 8 began the scheme by exploring a scene between Miss Trunchbull and Miss Honey, where they developed their comedic acting skills. They also explored the characters of Mr and Mrs Wormwood and Matilda in subsequent lessons. Students enjoyed developing the grotesque comedy present in the play. The scheme culminated in an assessment of students' rehearsal and acting skills.

The performances students developed over the half term were creative and entertaining. Year 8 demonstrated their outstanding exaggerated acting abilities in this scheme of work. Well done!





Year 6 Creative Design



In their Creative Design lessons, Year 6 students were set the task of making 3D hug buddies which were designed with visually impaired children as their target audience. The students created exciting, sensory designs that incorporated different textures and colours. They learnt how to sew on embellishments and filled their hug buddies with stuffing to make them 3D. Some students even added in plastic bags and other unusual items so that their hug buddy would have another sensory element! You can see their wonderful creations displayed in the glass cabinet outside the canteen.






Year 9 Drama: Adapting The Hate U Give into a Scene for Performance

In September, Year 9 Drama students began an exciting scheme of learning called 'Working with Text'.

In this scheme, students engage with a wide-range of texts as both an actor and a playwright. Students began exploring characters from two different stage adaptations of Malorie Blackman's Noughts and Crosses. In these lessons, they developed naturalistic acting skills and staging techniques. Year 9 students then worked with excerpts from the stage adaptation of Mark Haddon's novel The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night-Time. In these lessons, students experimented with developing creative movement and physical theatre in naturalistic scripted scenes. They learnt about the West End production of the play and Frantic Assembly's staging techniques. The scheme then continued with students considering how as playwrights they could adapt excerpts from these two novels.



After exploring Noughts and Crosses and The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night-Time, students then began adapting an excerpt from The Hate U Give into a scene for the stage. This was an exciting endeavour for students as this novel, though adapted into a film, has not yet been adapted for the stage. Students were able to take creative

license with their playwriting, while still ensuring they were truthful to Angie Thomas's intentions. Students then gave each other peer feedback, using feedback structures from a recorded playwriting workshop by the Tamasha Theatre Company. After receiving feedback, students developed their scenes further. In the final lesson, students performed each other's work in staged readings and gave each other further feedback.

These activities built on the playwriting skills students developed during lockdown. The adaptation exercises will also aid Year 9 students when they begin their devising work in the Spring Term. This scheme of learning continues for the remainder of the Autumn Term, with students exploring a play produced by the Tamasha Theatre Company, The Urban Girls' Guide to Camping. The scheme will culminate with students exploring 'DNA' by award-winning playwright Dennis Kelly.


Year 5 have started their topic, Off with Her Head and have familiarised themselves with Henry VIII timetable.

We were able to give a short presentation to parents outside on the final afternoon, marching up Melville Avenue behind our Roman Standard!



Year 13 Study Tips

As Year 13 progress through their final year of school, 13Laud discussed what advice they would give to their younger selves, based on their experience of revising for many exams. Some of the students are currently taking university entrance exams and Year 13 will have their school mock exams in January.

Here are their top tops:

- Go over notes regularly
- Make notes as you go along don't leave it until the last minute
- Ask questions
- Work consistently
- Don't rely too much on teachers, do some independent work
- However, don't be afraid to ask for help
- When revising, write everything you know first, then fill in the gaps
- Try teaching the topic to someone else
- Break up revision into chunksremember to take breaks. Revise in 20-45 minute slots, depending on what works for you.
- If you work best with music, try film or video game music.
- Find a study space that works for you, if possible away from where you have fun.
- Create a welcoming study space.

Year 9 Fitness Training

Year 9 have been working through a unit of work based on FITNESS. We've looked at different methods of training, different components of fitness and done some fitness tests. Here, some Year 9s are working to improve their AGILITY. Agility is the ability to change direction at speed and is a vital element of a number of sporting activities. They conducted a test based on agility and then devised some activities to improve their agility before completing the test for a second time to see if their score had improved.

They also looked at SPEED and REACTION TIME – both also vital elements of most sporting activities. This is great preparation for GCSE PE.



Gold Duke of Edinburgh Award




We have a great time just dancing and enjoying each others company and that for me is probably the best part of the club.
