



# AROUND THE PALACE

Dear all,

The start of term at Old Palace has been such a positive experience. Across Prep and Seniors we have really enjoyed welcoming everyone back after the summer break. It has also been wonderful to meet all the new students in Reception, Year 7 and other years who are joining the Old Palace family. The energy and enthusiasm across the school has been palpable.

We are hosting a number of Parent Information Evenings in the weeks ahead which will also give us a chance to welcome parents back into school. The dates were communicated to you

last term but as a reminder they can be found in the box on page 2.

I would also like to take this opportunity to share the successes of the summer in terms of exam results. After such a difficult time for our students, we were delighted with both their GCSE and A Level results.

At A Level, 49% of the entries were graded A\* and 81% graded A or above. These results placed Old Palace in the top 1% of the country in terms of A Level results which is excellent. 96% of our students gained a place at their chosen university which reflects not only their academic success but also the strength of the guidance and support they

received through the university admissions process.

In total, four students gained places at Oxford and Cambridge and five students gained entry to medicine/dentistry courses. What is particularly pleasing is the range of courses that our students will be starting this term in so many well regarded destinations. More detail on this is provided on page 2.

At GCSE, 49% of the entries were at grade 9 and 70% were grade 8 or above (this is equivalent to A\* under the old system). A total of 83% of entries were graded at 7 or above (equivalent to a A in 'old money'). In total a third of all

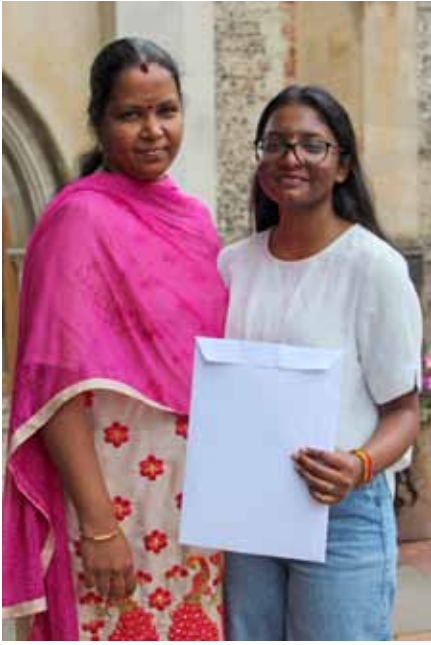

# A Level and GCSE Results





## Focus on University Destinations Summer 2021

This year, 96% of our students secured their chosen university, with 71% going to Russell Group Universities and four obtaining places at Oxford and Cambridge in Philosophy and German, Modern and Medieval Languages, Human, Social, and Political Sciences and Geography.

Just under half of all places were in STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths) with students choosing Civil Engineering, Chemistry, Biology, Natural Sciences, Computer Science, Software Engineering, Data Science and Psychology. Plus, in the popular healthcare subjects, Medicine, Dentistry, Midwifery, Optometry and Pharmacy.

Alongside this, the degree choices spanned a range of 20 different subjects reflecting the diversity and breadth of the Old Palace curriculum including: Audio and Music Technology; Classics; Dance; English; Geography; History; International Relations; Modern Languages; Politics

Four chose Joint Honours degrees in Philosophy and German, History and Politics, Criminology and Sociology, and English Language and Linguistics.

Over a third chose to study in London, six students secured a place at Kings College with four going to Royal Holloway, three at both Imperial and Queen Mary, two at City university and one at University College London.

Further afield Durham and Exeter will be the new home for another six students, with Edinburgh and Glasgow the farthest another three will need to travel to. Other universities include Manchester, Birmingham, Bristol, Nottingham, York, Warwick, Liverpool, Lancaster, Nottingham Trent, Chichester, Plymouth, Brighton, Medway and Leicester, quite a spread nationally.

# Festival of Science and Imagination



The Science Department gave everyone the opportunity to take part in a week of Science and Imagination during the summer. Here is my review of some of the events I attended...

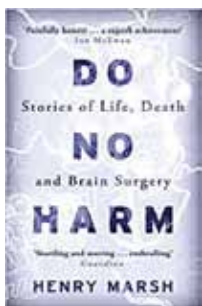


On Tuesday 13th July, I went to the Headway East London workshop. Headway East London is a local charity supporting people affected by brain injury from across the North and

East of London. Its services include advocacy, therapies and occupational projects like *Who Are You Now?* all based at its community centre in Hackney. It also offers specialist services to survivors and their families. The aim of this project is to help survivors regain their voices and the confidence to use them, and to help others understand the impact of brain injury.

The workshop they ran was about how Art and Science can be incorporated together; we had to draw something that represented our thoughts, personality and our brain. Some people drew their garden or a journey to the beach.

Why not have a go and try it as a relaxing activity? I would recommend it to anyone who loves Art and Science.



I also went to an event and listened to Henry Marsh CBE who is one of Britain's foremost neurosurgeons with over 40 years' experience and the author of *Do No Harm*, a brilliant book which I would definitely recommend future doctors and surgeons to read. He has sold over 1 million copies of his book worldwide.

Marsh has worked at Atkinson Morley's in St. George's London and been in many interviews and documentaries over the years. He has not operated for over two years but likes to keep busy. Marsh came from a non-scientific family. He has a competitive personality and is very ambitious to a certain extent in surgery even though there is a high failure rate in neurosurgery.

Marsh kept a diary from the age of 12 years old, it took him ten years to write the book every day and publish it. He gives a very honest account about what life is like, failure and being nervous and anxious as a neurosurgeon. Marsh

is currently reading five or six books at a time including fantasy, Dickens, Science and History.

Henry Marsh gave some very inspirational quotes that I would like to share with you.

*'If it wasn't for microscopes, we wouldn't have science!'*

*'Most doctors don't want to be surgeons and most surgeons don't want to be neurosurgeons'*

*'We depend upon science'*

*'Science is all about asking questions'*

*'Science is fascinating and so interesting'*

*'Genes are like machine tools. The same gene will do different things in different circumstances'*

*'It is vital that our brains can write and read so fluently as they have evolved over time'*

*'Writing is second nature and therapy'*

*'There is no worse thing for a patient than a frightened doctor'*

*'Ask for help. It is a sign of strength not weakness'*

On Thursday 15th July I went to an event about the DNA story by Dr Lisa Mullan. It all started in Ancient Greece when people had spots that exploded called Small Pox and 1 in 5 people who had it died. It spread to Europe, Asia and finally America. If you caught it once, you could not catch it again. Your immune system receives stress signals from antigens and gives out antibodies. Pus from Small Pox pustules was inserted into the bloodstream and Small Pox scabs were ground up and blown up people's noses. Both of these took place in order to inoculate the people. Dr Edward Jenner born in 1749 realised that farmers never seemed to get Small Pox. Cows had a similar disease on their udders called Cow Pox. In 1796 he used an 8 year old boy to test his theory again and again. Then he found a vaccination; called that due to the Latin name of a cow being vacca. Did you know that due to this discovery 5 million lives a year are saved?

## Charles Darwin and the theory of evolution

A monk in Austria worked with peas for eight years and looked at 10 000 of them in 1886. They worked out that offspring pass information down to their offspring via the Double Helix.

Sarah Gilbert developed a vaccine for COVID 19 coronavirus in 14 days due to enhanced technology.

I learnt so much from these events in just a few days. If you are interested in Science, Art and English then I recommended looking at the recordings of these events and others that are available until 13th September.
