Enterprise Club

Over the course of the autumn term, the Year 7 members of the Enterprise Club worked hard to come up with and produce products for the School's annual PTA Christmas Fair.

Initially, we spent a lot of time thinking of products that best suited our potential target market. Eventually, we came up with the idea of hot chocolate reindeers and 'guess the weight of the cake' as they were both Christmas themed and catered for young and old.

I found producing our product (the reindeers) enlightening as it provided an insight into the world of work, especially for smaller businesses. It was fascinating seeing how much time and effort goes into planning and marketing. I found decorating the cake fun as we had free creative choice around the design while still sticking to the theme of Christmas. (Many congratulations to Mrs Morris, who won the cake).

Throughout the term we got to develop key skills such as time management,

the art of delegation and teamwork, as we worked together to make and package the reindeers. Leading up to the Christmas Fair we spent many hours budgeting and purchasing products. We hit a few bumps in the road from miscalculation i.e. not having enough supplies, so we had to quickly problem solve the issue so we could move on.

On the day of the Fair, we were able to market and sell our products and even make a small profit. The Fair was fun and we got to interact with potential customers and to use persuasion tactics in order to entice people into buying our products.

Overall, I thoroughly enjoyed the experience and I learnt that a lot of thought and planning goes into running

Drama - Beauty And The Beast

In the spring term, we were thrilled to be able to enjoy the Senior School's long-awaited performance of Disney's Beauty And The Beast. It was such a joy to see the students from Years 7-13 taking part, not to mention our orchestra, who provided the music each night. It was a wonderful experience for everyone involved.



The Library •

Every two weeks, Year 7 students have Library lessons as part of their English curriculum. These lessons focus on reading and information literacy skills.

Year 7 students follow the Accelerated Reading programme. This is a personalised reading scheme that promotes reading the 'right' level for each student. Students read from books within their reading range, taking quizzes on the books they read. A word count from successfully passed quizzes is recorded and all Year 7 students have the target to become a 'Million Word Reader'. Every book read in Year 7 counts towards the House Reading Challenge, with a special Accelerated Reader Year 7 Word Reading Challenge for the Year 7 class that together, reads the most words.

Year 7 students also take part in the whole school House Reading Challenge, with termly prizes for students reading and writing book reviews on six or more books a term.



Love reading? Love helping people choose what to read? Year 7 can join other students to be trained up as a Student Librarian.

Become a Student Librarian!

Recruitment takes place in the autumn term. Student librarians help library staff with organising the library and make book suggestions, book displays.

They also assist with events such as Harry Potter Book Night, open days, seasonal charity events and World Book Day, including interviewing and welcoming guest authors.



Book Club

Weekly lunch time book clubs allow students to discover the best new books and classics through seasonal activities including National Poetry Day and World Book Day.



Old Palace Book Club shadows national Book Awards throughout the academic year, including the Trinity Schools Book Award, The Carnegie and Kate Greenaway Award and The Excelsior Awards.

Old Palace has close ties with the oldest children's book award, the Carnegie and Kate Greenaway Award, now in its 86th year.

Mrs Chevalier, our librarian, is currently one of the thirteen national

judges, which means students get to understand first hand what it is like to 'think like a judge', exploring themes linked to the style, plot, characterisation, style of a book and decide for themselves what should make a winner.



Science ·····

In Science, Year 7 have been studying acids and alkalis. We learnt that if we mixed a substance with vegetable dye (indicator) we could tell what sort of substance it was (acid, alkali or neutral).

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Our vegetable dye was red cabbage indicator. We made it by boiling the red cabbage in water, which turned dark blue, and then we used the blue solution as our dye. In Litmus, if the substance turns red when you mix the indicator with the substance, that means the substance is an acid. If it turns blue, it is an alkali and also, if it turns purple it is a neutral substance like water. In our indicator some substances changed it green, pink, purple and blue.

So, in the lesson we learnt that the different variety of colours you may see, depends on the type of indicator you use. It was really fun!

Science Challenges

Practical Problem Solving Club

Year 7-13 students devise engineering structures/ machines to solve a given problem, using very simple materials.

Art ••••

Year 7 artists have been producing work on the theme *Flora* this year. They started the year focusing on markmaking, line drawing and tone. With this they produced observational drawings of a vase of flowers, focusing on shape and form before completing a sustained tonal drawing. This was supported by a contextual study which looked at the art work of Paul Morrison and in this they included their own personal response to the work.

Year 7 artists follow on by consolidating their knowledge on colour theory and create a large coloured tonal flora based painting. The year concludes with a sculptural project.









Quilling Workshop

The Art department ran a Quilling workshop where Year 7 students could learn how to make intricate floral pictures using rolled up paper. All of the results were really beautiful!



Looking Ahead to University & Careers

University and Careers advice continues from Year 7, as part of our PSHE programme with discussions on personal career aspirations, understanding the differences between skills, abilities and qualities and then researching these through career pathways in Year 8, in preparation for choosing their GCSEs in Year 9.

In Year 10, students who are interested in healthcare or veterinary careers can join MedSoc. Here we do activities to develop skills that demonstrate the values required for these professions. For example, last term Year 10 named the bones of the human body, learned about different careers in the NHS and played games to improve their communication skills. Our Sixth Formers also shared their experiences of applying for medical school. In the news at the beginning of 2022 the heart has featured and, with



Valentine's Day approaching, Year 10 have looked at stories on the scarcity of organs for transplant and about a pioneering operation in the US to transplant a genetically modified pig's heart into a man. Students examined heart structure and discussed the medical and ethical challenges of transplanting organs from humans and animals.

Outdoors Maths: Human Loci



Maths isn't just for inside the classroom! When we introduce the Loci topic, our Year 7 students get to experience the fun of an outside Maths lesson.

As Mrs Stevens put the students into groups and Mrs Morris brought out cones, the girls wondered what all this could possibly be about.

In their groups, they were challenged to follow the rules and stand in the right places in relation to the cones. First, Mrs Morris asked them to stand one metre away from a single cone.

The groups quickly realised that they had formed a circle around the cone. Then they had to stand equidistant (an equal distance) from two cones. They formed a line, which they recognised to be the perpendicular bisector of the line between the two cones. As the lesson progressed, the students developed a sense of the sorts of shapes they were forming by following the rules, and recognised them from the constructions they had learned earlier.

At the end of the activity, the groups participated in a competitive speed round, in which they were challenged to reproduce the shapes before the other groups in the hope of

winning a small prize.

The groups all did a fantastic job and the prizes were well deserved. When the students returned to the classroom, they were energised and ready to translate their outdoor experience into questions on paper.

Design Technology

Year 7 began the academic year by making a wooden planner cover. The planner cover can be attached to their school diaries and is a lovely way of personalising them. Their designs were based on the Chinese Zodiac calendar.

They then made a space themed musical money box. This fun product incorporated many areas of technology and an abundance of new skills. It was quite challenging for Year 7 especially since many had not experienced the subject before. However, they coped really well with all tasks and their finished items were great!

The idea behind the money boxes was to encourage young children to save their money in a fun way!

When you drop your coin through the slot in the top of the box, it triggers a tune to play, followed by two small LED's which light up in the plastic vacuum formed light.

New skills learnt included: soldering electronic components onto a W, programming a tune using a software program called Blocky, vacuum forming their moon and assembling their wooden boxes with the various electronic wires being secured in the correct places.





Tinkercad

2 eggs	

A few drops of vanilla essence

Half teaspoon baking powder

Pre heat oven to 190°C.


Put all the ingredients into a large bowl. Mix with electric beaters. Spoon into cases. Bake in oven for 12 – 15 mins until golden brown.

You may experiment with different flavours (1 dessert spoon of cocoa powder, dried fruit)



Inner platform for the cake to sit on



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
Year 7 DT Creative workshop

From September '21, Year 7 have been attending Creative workshops after school on a Thursday which has replaced homework in the creative subjects.

In DT they have been exploring different drawing skills and rendering techniques by hand and through using a CAD software program called Tinkercad.

Tinkercad enables you to realise 2D sketches into 3D more realistic images by using simple drawing tools. Students have worked really well and have managed to find their way around this software platform very effectively.

Old Palace Named in The Cricketer's Top 20 Girls Schools





We are very proud to have been included in the Cricketer **Magazine's Top** 20 Girls Schools/ **Schools Guide** 2022.

It's a real testament to our PE staff and pupils as, to quote The Cricketer: "The number and standard of entries we received was extremely high this year and you should be very proud of your inclusion."

They went on to say: "The Cricketer has published its Schools Guide 2022, featuring the top 100 senior, the top 50 prep/junior and the top 20 allgirls schools in a bumper 156-page supplement.

It follows an exhaustive process which saw a huge number of schools submit entries to be included in the guide. All entries were judged against an extensive set of criteria, which included a compelling commitment to cricket in the curriculum, facilities, fixture programmes and coaching.

Also taken into account was how schools kept the game alive during the pandemic, and how they look to ensure cricket remains a central part of school life.

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The Cricketer gathered entries and compiled the leading lists, working alongside former England star Lydia Greenway and her coaching initiative Cricket For Girls to select the top 20 allgirls schools."

Mrs Smith, Director of Sport at Old Palace says: "We are delighted to be recognised in this publication. Women's Cricket has so much to offer and we are thrilled to be able to introduce cricket to students at Old Palace. We look forward to developing this area in the coming years."

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Sport at Old Palace

Swimming

We are fortunate to have our own four lane 25m pool allowing students a weekly swimming lesson with a member of the PE staff and a qualified swimming coach.

Lessons include stroke work, synchronized swimming, personal survival and life saving skills as well as many other water related skills such as diving and sculling. As well as lessons there are open access swimming clubs and selective squad training sessions as well as representation at local and regional events.

For those who want to make use of the pool to develop their skills or receive some extra help starting out in swimming, the department runs a weekly early morning swimming session starting at 7.25am.

Swimming is a vital life skill and so we do all we can to ensure students have water confidence and sound skills.



Synchronised Swimming and

Life Saving In lessons all students are given the chance to participate in Synchronised Swimming, bringing together swimming, gymnastics and dance elements carefully choreographed in the water. They also have taster sessions for Lifesaving and Personal Survival. These very important life skills are covered in depth as the students move into Year 8.

Water Polo

This sport has really taken off at OPS and is very popular. Students get to try it in lessons and there is a Water Polo Club. We have recently introduced Water Polo into the Year 9 PE curriculum to take full advantage of our pool. In recent years we have been involved in the English Schools Competition where Old Palace qualified for the finals!

One of our Sixth Form students started Water Polo here at Old Palace and now represents Great Britain in the role of GK in the U19 National Team.



Languages - Food and Festivals in France

At the end of last term in French, we learnt about food. Near the end of the term, we were set a project. We had to create a poster with a paper plate on it with our favourite meal and a paragraph in French saying what it was and as a little extra task we could say what we like to have as a starter and as a dessert.

We had to use old household items (after asking our parents of course!) to make the meal to put on our plate. If we liked to eat chips ('des frites') we would find an old yellow sponge and cut it up into chip shapes. It was a really fun project to do and a really interesting way to find out how to put together a paragraph in French. There was a huge variety of things brought in by my classmates!

We are all very excited to see the display in the classroom. To completely round off the topic, we came back from the Christmas holidays to learn all about the major chefs in France that make La gastronomie, a type of expensive and succulent food served extremely beautifully with many courses.

These chefs included: Paul Bocuse, Joël Robuchon and Alain Ducasse, all chefs who are incredibly famous throughout the world. All three of them have got many restaurants across the globe.



We also all really enjoyed discovering about the festival called "l'Epiphanie" and the way French people celebrate it with the special cake "la galette". Dance

This term in Year 7 Dance the students have explored Parkour, an extreme practice that consists of traversing environmental obstacles by running, climbing and leaping in the most efficient and rapid way. Parkour (also known as Freerunning) began in France in the 1980s. The focus is to maintain as much momentum as possible whilst still remaining safe. This is performed by using only the human body and the surroundings.

Parkour can include: obstacle courses, running, climbing, sliding, swinging, vaulting, crawling, jumping, and rolling movement.

The students have learnt a range of technical exercises that have helped to develop skills required for Parkour. Next term the students will explore Parkour creatively whilst choreographing motifs based on the outside environment and famous landmarks.

What is Parkour?

Parkour is the primarily noncompetitive physical discipline of training to move freely over and through any terrain using only the abilities of the body, principally through running, jumping, climbing and guadrupedal movement. In practice it focuses on developing the fundamental attributes required for such movement.

Nutcracker

During our Dance lessons, we have been learning about Matthew Bourne's Nutcracker. Matthew Bourne is a British choreographer and dancer who is known for his modern versions of traditional ballets such as the Nutcracker. He has mainly choreographed ballet and contemporary pieces and focuses on using the body instead of words to tell a story. This is called interpretive dance.

66 Parkour has taught us to consider our expressive skills such as spatial awareness, focus and sensitivity towards other dancers. As a class we have enjoyed learning different technical exercises whilst improving our concentration and self-assurance to perform with energy and momentum!



We have been learning about the character of Clara, who is an orphan. We watched the beginning of the work and analysed how Clara and the other orphans effectively showed the narrative of tidying up and getting the orphanage ready for an inspection. We discussed the techniques and gestures used in the dance and our teachers showed us how to use facial expressions and characterisation to narrate the story. We thoroughly enjoyed studying the role

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of Clara and look forward to learning about a new set of characters, the Gobstoppers, next term.

However, if you don't see where you live on the map here, do please talk to us – we are always happy to accommodate families wherever possible.







History

Year 7 have made a great start to studying History. As part of our new thematic curriculum, students looked first at the topic of Empires. This included evaluating the British empire but also took in the Mughal, Ottoman, and Malian empires, allowing students to see the commonalities and differences of imperial projects across time and space. We then moved on to migration, where students engaged with both the history of the Israeli-Palestine conflict and the experience and legacies of the Windrush migration.



In the final few weeks of term, Year 7 also produced some terrific work uncovering the fascinating history that existed just within their own families! These family history projects involved spending some quality time talking to their parents, aunts, uncles, or grandparents to discover what their own families have been through.

Students produced compelling PowerPoint presentations that documented the fascinating lives their relatives had led. Sometimes this was eye-opening experiences of war or migration, but it also included our Year 7s learning about the equally jaw-dropping realities of everyday life before phones and computers!

To end the project, students then practised their public speaking as they got to share their fantastic presentations with each other.

Since returning in January, it's been on to the theme of monarchy - from our current Queen to the Obas of Benin!

It has also been wonderful to see how many Year 7s have played an active role in History Club. The club is open to all students in years 7 and 8 who want to find out more about the past in a fun and interactive way.

Different historical topics that have been studied this year include crime and punishment and piracy, as well as having a further look at the history of Old Palace itself which dates back to at least the 12th century! Led by our sixth formers, History Club is an interesting and exciting way that Year 7s have learned about subjects that many have never studied before, while also getting to know students in other forms and years.





Latin

This term, Year 7 students have been working towards Latin mastery. They have developed their vocabulary understanding and have become more confident when translating longer passages.

The students have recently met with the challenge of working with perfect and imperfect tenses and making use of present and perfect stems.

This is a considerable challenge but the students have worked hard to meet this and continue their journey towards mastery of Latin.



Geography

Our theme in Geography Club this term is 'Are we drowning in plastic?'. Our aim is to promote the global challenge of what to do with our plastic waste.

Inspired by the TV programme 'War on Plastic' we started by surveying the school, collecting plastic bottles in form rooms – we collected 157 in 5 days! We then calculated that across a school year this could equate to 5,800 bottles, that's 40,000 bottles during an average student's seven years at Senior School. That is a LOT of single use plastic!

Our club includes students from Year 7 to 12, and we are currently creating an awareness campaign which we hope will encourage everyone to think before buying items of single use plastic. We are creating a mosaic using bottle tops to highlight the damage plastic can do to wildlife, and planning to create a wall installation using bottles too. We also

hope to work with catering to reduce our use of plastics even further.

6 facts about single use plastic:

- 73% of beach litter is plastic
- Plastic is made from oil which is a fossil fuel. (Recycling plastic uses 80% less energy than making new plastics)
- More than 5 trillion pieces of plastic are already floating in our oceans
- Each 1 litre plastic bottle uses 4 million joules of energy to make

- World plastic production has increased from 2.1 million tonnes in 1950 to 406 million in 2015
- 1 million plastic drinks bottles are sold every minute globally – nearly half are produced by one company
