#### Prep: Let Girls Play Football Tournament

On Wednesday, all the pupils at Prep took part in a fun filled session of football. They really enjoyed learning some new skills and the older students were able to put them into practice on the field.

#### Did you know?

The Football Association (The FA) has recently launched a campaign to ensure that girls have the same access to football in schools, and in clubs as boys do by 2024. #LetGirlsPlay

Research shared as part of the campaign shows that football is very popular amongst girls, and that the numbers of girls engaged in football is continuing to grow. Whilst football is the most popular team sport for young people in England, only a third of girls aged 5-18 years participate each week. The research findings show that that 90% of girls that play, enjoy it. 60% of these girls that play football in schools want to play more and 91% of girls that don't play, want the opportunity to do so.

As part of the same research, girls reported that the benefits to playing football were both physical and holistic:

- 88% play to keep fit and healthy
- 73% plan to learn/develop social skills
- 73% play because it increases their self-confidence
- 52% play to relieve stress and worry and 92% play because it is fun



A big thank you to Tahalia and Bethany in Year 10 for helping run this event. Tahalia and Bethany both play for Crystal Palace (see pg 17) and love football. Along with Mr Gough from the Senior PE Department they were able to help inspire the Prep students to enjoy playing football and answered a lot of questions from the students.

This week, Cookery Club made super yummy cheesecake!








#### World Book Day: The Storyteller Visits Prep

They compete against tens of schools from all over the country and put on an amazing performance each time, speaking about complex ethical and political issues.



#### Seniors: LGBTQ+ History Month

2022 sees the 50th anniversary of the very first Pride March in the UK in 1972. A popular slogan of the early Gay Rights Movement of the time was "the personal is political", and so, as a school we chose to focus on openly LGBTQ+ artists, and how their visibility today is important to the LGBTQ+ community.



Students from the school's LGBTQ+ group, Q&A, led a whole school assembly on the importance of visibility and the artists who inspire them. Students chose to focus on Lil Nas X, a 22-year-old American rapper who was the first openly LBGTQ+ musician to win a Country Music Association award, Cavetown, a 23-year-old British indie-pop musician who came out as transgender in 2020, Alice Oseman, the British author of the Heartstopper series who herself identifies as Aroace (Aromantic and Asexual), and Angelina Jolie, Hollywood's highest-paid actress, who is openly bisexual amongst others.

The artists selected represented many different identities under the LGBTQ+ umbrella, but all have one thing in common; their visibility makes it easier for future generations to identify and celebrate their LGBTQ+ identity.

Our theme of visibility was continued by the flying of

the progress flag on the Old Palace flag pole throughout February. This recent design, created in 2018 by artist Daniel Quasar, builds on Gilbert Baker's original rainbow flag which was invented in 1978, but has added black, brown, pink, pale blue and white stripes to represent marginalised people of colour in the LGBTQ+ community, as well as the trans community, and those living with HIV/AIDS. These colours form an arrow on the left-hand side of the flag, showing that things are moving forward, but that progress still needs to be made.

There were a number of exciting events held throughout the school designed to celebrate and recognise the significance of the month. The History and Politics departments led with lectures on the history of LGBTQ+ rights within the UK, and on the battles still faced within this community.

In Art, students focused on the work of Jean-Michel Basquiat, an American Neo-Expressionist who created over 1000 works in his 8-year career. Basquiat's work may appear as child-like scribbles on the outset, but on closer inspection reveal serious ideas and comments about society, and students used his work as inspiration for their own political images, which are now on display for all to see.

The month ended with a badge making party hosted by the students from Q&A themselves, where all were invited to make badges that represented the parts of their identities that they most wanted to be visible. From names and pronouns, to allyship and friendship, this party was a celebration of the diverse community at Old Palace, and was an event enjoyed by all. The money raised from the badges has been sent to Schools Out, to ensure that LGBTQ+ history month can continue to be recognised and celebrated across the UK for years to come.




#### **LGBTQ+ Sticker Competition**

#### Sixth Form: University Mathematics Preparation Course

Every spring term, Mathematics students in Year 12 have the opportunity to take part in a course of lessons after school. These are to give students a taster of the mathematics involved in admissions tests. They look at STEP (Sixth Term Examination Papers), MAT (Mathematics Admissions Tests) and the TMUA (Test of Mathematics for University Admissions). These are required to study many mathematical subjects at the top universities. For example, Engineering, Computer Science, Physics, and of course Mathematics!

The benefit of studying these tests is that the content does not go beyond A Level syllabus, but the style of questioning is much more challenging. Students have to learn how to work at extended pieces of algebra, problem solve and apply familiar skills in unfamiliar contexts. This is excellent preparation for their A Level Mathematics examinations.

The students really enjoy the sessions, meeting the challenged they face with determination and perseverance. Here are some quotes from students that attended the course this year:

Here is a question that seems simple at first, but turns out to be surprisingly involved! It is one of Mrs Morris' favourites and is from Stephen Siklos' *Advanced Problems in Core Mathematics* Book.

Show that you can make up 10 pence in eleven ways using 10p, 5p, 2p and 1p coins. In how many ways can you make up 20 pence using 20p, 10p, 5p, 2p and 1p coins?

#### Solution:

Probably the best approach is to start counting with the arrangements which use as many high denomination coins as possible, then work down.

We can make up 10p as follows:

10;

5+5 (one way using two 5p coins);

5+2+2+1, 5+2+1+1+1, 5+1+1+1+1+1, (three ways using one 5p coin);

2+2+2+2+2+2+2+2+1+1, etc, (six ways using no 5p coins);

making a total of 11 ways.

We can make up 20p as follows:

20;

10 + any of the 11 arrangements in the first part of the question;

5+5+5+5;

5+5+5+2+2+1, etc (3 ways using three 5p coins);

5+5+2+2+2+2+2+2+2+2+2+1+1 etc (6 ways using two 5p coins);

5+2+2+2+2+2+2+2+1, etc (8 ways using one 5 and making 15 out of 2p and 1p coins);

2+2+2+2+2+2+2+2+2+2+2, etc (11 ways of making 20p with 2p and 1p coins).

Grand total = 41.





#### Year 7: Race for Life

This week, during PE lessons students have been taking part in Race for Life.

We also implemented this as part of their Swimming lessons. Classes each took part in a T20, a timed 20 minute continuous swim. Lengths were counted for each participant, then added together for class totals.

Each House tally was then added together for a grand Year 7 total of lengths, distance swum in both metric and imperial, and furthest individual swimmer in each Year 7 House.

7 Hatton swam the furthest achieving a very impressive 321 lengths, 8,025 metres, 4.98 miles!

Bella swam an outstanding 46 lengths, 1150 metres adding to the 7 Hatton tally!


